COURSE OVERVIEW

The focus of **English 11** is to read, analyze, and write about our country's literature that emphasizes history, diverse cultures, and issues. We will start with Native American myths, which are the oldest stories established through oral tradition and show much about early cultures and beliefs. The course will also feature the forming of our nation, including the unknown and hysteria of a new land, slavery, Revolutionary writings and rhetoric, American gothic (yes, Edgar Allan Poe!), Romanticism and Transcendentalism, Realism, Harlem Renaissance, and contemporary literature. Other components of this course are argumentative essay, public speaking, debates, literary analysis essay, and an APA research paper.
