

DUES—DUES—DUE

Do youse (sic) – want to know some sad statistics about the dues received by the Shamokin Area Alumni Association.

This past year 1997 the association received a grand total of \$2,421.00. We estimate that we send out, in round figures, about 11,000 newsletters. That means that we receive the \$2 dues payment from about 1,210.5 members who receive the newsletter. This is about an 11% return. The cost of mailing the newsletter is as follows.

Printing	6,087.69
Postage	1,491.39
Return Mail Charges	396.35
Return Envelopes	445.20

This a total of \$8,420.63. That means it costs the association \$.76 to have the newsletter mailed to you. In order for the association to break even on these mailing charges it would be necessary for 4,210 of you former graduates to remit the \$2 dues to the Treasurer.

That is about double the responses we received last year. We must also take into consideration that some members sent in more than the \$2 for the current year. They sent money to cover the years that they did not send any dues. It would be a fine gesture on your part to consider doing the same this year. We really need your support to continue to be the oldest continuous Alumni Association in the United States.

Also the above cost factor of \$396.35 for return mail postage (it costs the association \$.50 for every newsletter that is not delivered) could be decreased if you would no-

tify the registrar whenever you move. The number of people remitting their dues by class in 1997 is as follows:

Secretary's Report

The 114th annual reunion of the Shamokin Area High School Alumni Association was held Saturday, May 24, 1997. The high school cafeteria area, which was recently remodeled, was the setting for the dinner. The auditorium was the setting for the entertainment and business meeting. Three hundred forty-four were in attendance.

The invocation was given by Rev. John P. Gundikunst, pastor of Tharptown Emanuel Methodist Church. The pledge to the flag followed and the singing of "God Bless America" was accompanied by Irvin Liachowitz on the piano. A family style dinner was catered and served by the Country House Restaurant. Pam Grow Keiser, president introduced the officers and William Korbich, treasurer, spoke in honor of H. Richard Hilbush who was very active in the association also noting there was a box at one end of a table for those wishing to contribute to the memorial award fund started by Hilbush's niece.

President Keiser opened the business meeting with a few moments of silent prayer for the deceased members of the association. On motion of Glenn Henninger and a second given by Don Milbrand the secretary's report was not given. On motion of Harold Grow and a second given by John Schankweiler the treasurer's report was not given.

The president of the 1997 senior class presented their class pennant and recognized their officers.

The entertainment included selections from the high school show "Music Man". Members of the cast were accompanied by Mrs. Bonny Klinger. "The Sadder But Wiser Girl" was sung by Mike Ladd and Sharon Klinger sang "Til There Was You".

Mary Ann Pitorak Miller of the program committee was assisted by seniors, handing out the prizes for those holding the winning tickets.

Eugene Boughner, high school principal, gave remarks on the high school cit-

ing it as having the oldest active alumni association. It was noted the cafeteria was changed to be able to see and hear better, with columns having been removed. There were 12,014 enrolled in Jr-Sr high school. Two students won merit scholarships. There are 2 new labs with 30 new computers. Mr. Boughner expressed very positive things the students have accomplished and how the high school is used by the community. A "mock parole hearing" was taped by the television class for the state commission to use for viewing.

Vice president, Nick Keiser, introduced the anniversary classes. Those classes that wished to contribute to the general fund and the educational fund were recognized. Some of these classes gave to the memorial award fund for Mr. Hilbush. To the general fund —class of 1932 gave \$1932; class of 1942 gave \$800. To the H. Richard Hilbush fund — class of 1967 gave \$250; class of 1972 gave \$437; class of 1953 citing they were the first class to have Mr. Hilbush as class advisor donated \$300. To the educational fund —class of 1937 gave \$1637; class of 1942 gave \$1942; class of 1947 gave \$6219.47; class of 1957 gave \$1957; class of 1967 gave \$250. Some representatives said they would be having class parties in the summer and funds would be forthcoming at that time.

Gifts were given to the attending members of the class of 1947 in recognition of their golden anniversary. The vice president presented the distance award to Arthur Shipe, Jr., class of 1937 who traveled from Seattle, Washington.

Irvin Liachowitz, member of the Educational Trust Fund Committee, introduced the scholarship winners. This year Coal Township presented a \$1,900 award in the name of Edward Baker and \$1,100 award in the name of Anthony Konopka in addition to the \$2,000 award they have been presenting. Fifty-four seniors signed up and 41 took the scholarship exam.

Ninth award: was a three-way tie of \$500 each, going to — Christopher Shaffer attending Bloomsburg University, Joleen Bressi attending Philadelphia Pharmacy of Science and Paula Henderson attending Gettysburg College.

Eighth award: \$1000 to Jason Golumbskie attending Drexel University.

Seventh award: \$1100 (Coal Twp.) to Edward Dobeck attending Drexel University.

Sixth award: \$1200 to Michael Ladd attending Penn State.

Fifth award: \$1400 to Frederick Broschious attending Lebanon Valley.

Fourth award: \$1700 to Amber Gundikunst attending Philadelphia Textile of Science.

Third award: \$1900 (Coal Twp) to Rachel Meredith attending New York University.

Second award: \$2000 (Coal Twp) to Jared Burns attending Bucknell University.

First award: \$2100 to Stephen Stadnicki attending Penn State.

Ratification of officers nominated by the executive committee of the association for 1997-98 were: Nick Keiser, '79, president; Susan Kropinski, '75, vice president; Joan Fauland Eltringham, '59 secretary; William Korbich, '54, treasurer; Jeffrey Clutcher, '78, registrar and Helen Jane Murphy, '43, historian. On motion of Ned Sodrick and a second given by Shirley Hughes, all were in favor. Nominated to replace two positions on the educational trust fund committee and terms expired were: James Booth, William Korbich, John Schankweiler and Tom Olcese. On motion of Jeffrey Clutcher and a second given by Don Milbrand the motion passed with all in favor.

The business meeting concluded with the singing of the Alma Mater and the benediction was given by Rev. Gundeikunst. The members and guests returned to the cafeteria for the afterglow where they danced until midnight to the music of The Jack Fries Quartet and eat a buffet catered by the Country House Restaurant. Prizes were given throughout the evening for dance contests and musical chairs.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FROM THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The scholarship fund was founded on the idea that it would be a challenge to furnish financial aid to our graduates to pursue their education in institutions of high learning. The fund was formed in 1922. It was originally to give financial assistance to the first honor student desiring a higher education.

In 1930 the fund balance was \$3,925.79. The original idea was to give a \$ 150 scholarship for a period of four years, but not until the fund reached \$25,000. Until that time the interest on the money invested was awarded on a one year basis.

The money to increase the balance of the fund came from individual contributions, food sales, dances, plays, and talent shows. In 1947 the Century Club was initiated. Those who contribute \$ 100 in any one year would have their name published in the annual bulletin.

In 1949 the class of 1924 (the silver anniversary class 25 years) put forth an organized effort to raise money and they donated \$1,101.85. From that point on a friendly rivalry developed between the anniversary classes. In 1953 the class of 1913 donated \$1913 and the class of 1928 donated \$1928. The goal of \$25,000 was met in 1951.

The balance on December 1957 totaled \$49,800.21. This was the beginning of the celebration of the 75th year of the association.

Now awards are determined through competitive examinations (they were originally prepared by the high school faculty). They are impartially administered under the supervision of a qualified person appointed by the Scholarship Committee. The results are graded by a faculty member who is not aware of whose papers are submitted for grading. Each paper bearing an identifying number only. A sealed envelope containing the names and numbers of the students is entrusted to the Alumni Secretary who breaks the seal in full view of those attending the Association Annual Meeting.

In 1954 the awards were increased to two awards of \$200 for 4 years and \$ 100 for 2 years.

Today the Shamokin Area Alumni Educational Fund awards 8 scholarships in the Amounts of \$2,100—\$1,700—\$1,400—\$1,200—1,000—(3) \$500 for a total of \$8,900 to the graduating seniors and these same awards are given to the award winners for the past three years for a total \$35,600 awards each year. This is possible because the fund has grown to a balance of \$691,751. This money is invested with Northern Central Bank in a Trust fund and the management fees and the scholarships are paid from the interest earned each year. These awards are not guaranteed for this amount, the amount is determined on the interest on a year to year basis. However we have never had to decrease the original amount of the award. We have however, over the years increased the number of awards. The opinion of the trustees of the Educational Fund is that when more money is available for awards we will increase the number of awards rather than increase the value of the existing awards.

Shamokin and Coal Township schools merged in 1965 and Coal Township has maintained its Alumni Association. They also award scholarships based on the same test that is administered to the students and this year they have increased their awards so that they give 4 scholarships. Their awards are for the sums of \$2,100—\$1,900—\$1,100 (not sure of the amount of the fourth award) for a total of over \$5,000. That means that the graduating students of Shamokin Area High School are awarded over \$50,000 worth of scholarships from both alumni associations.

In addition to these scholarships we also give a \$50 award at the scholastic awards program for the highest average in the following subject areas. Language—English—Science—Social Studies—

Business Ed—Vocational—Art.

The class of 1913 established a savings account to pay the amount of interest to the Salutatorian of the graduating class. They put enough money aside that the account today still has a balance of about \$275.

A family started a trust and this trust pays \$ 100 to the editor of the yearbook staff and (at one time the editor of the school newspaper which we no longer have) now this year they have indicated that they want the drum major of the band to receive a \$ 100 award.

Two years ago we received two trusts to be administered by the association in the sum of \$20,000 and \$5,000 with the interest to be paid for one year to a student who is accepted in an accredited nursing program. And an award to the top student in the home economics department in the high school and the top student in the food preparation class in the vocational school

This year we received a trust of \$6,000 in honor of a teacher (Mr. Peter J. Malafi, a business education teacher) who passed away. The interest to be paid to a business student who will be attending a school of higher learning. The criteria established by the wife of the deceased teacher.

We also began a Trust fund for a retired teacher (Mr. H. Richard Hilbush, an English teacher) who was very active in the alumni association we have already received \$2,200 and the interest on this trust will be paid to a student based on criteria established by the family and the English Department.

At the 1997 annual banquet we received donations from the anniversary classes of over \$ 15,000 some of which went into the general fund and some of which went into the educational fund. Each class designates where they want their money to be distributed.

GENERAL FUND

The general fund should need no explanation. This fund is what keeps the association operating smoothly. Your contributions to the general fund allows the Executive Committee of the association make prudent financial decisions. Because of the lack of alumni members submitting their annual dues, the general fund donations are used to make up the difference to make this newsletter available to all alumni, and to keep the cost of the reunion at a reasonable amount.

Last year was a very good year for contributions to the general fund, we would like to thank you for your generosity, and hope that the same will continue this year. However I would like to point out to you the following for both

the general fund and the educational fund.

The general fund contributions 1997 were \$11,416.00. Of this amount \$6,380.53 was by members contributing to the Century Club. Fifty-nine members contributed this amount and the class of 1932 contributed \$1,475.00. The Fifty Year Class of 1948 contributed \$3,005.53. That means that \$1,900 was contributed to the Century Club by the other classes. But of the Total amount contributed only \$5,035.47 came from all other donations. If the anniversary classes stop carrying the major portion of these donations we will start to feel a financial crisis.

The Educational fund is in the same position. Fortunately the trustees have invested prior moneys with great fore-

sight so that it is a solvent Fund for the future. However, with rising costs contributions to this fund are still needed.

The Educational Fund contributions for 1997 were \$15,105.97. Of this amount \$10,157.00 was by members contribution to the Century Club. Seventy-nine members contributed this amount. Of the total amount contributed \$4,948.97 came from all other donations.

We again thank those who contributed so generously in past years and hope that you will continue in the future. For those who have not been contributors to our cause, we ask you to consider helping keep our association solvent.

BANQUET TALK

Did you know that this year the Shamokin Area Alumni Association will hold its **115th consecutive Alumni Reunion**. This reunion will be in the form of a Dinner Banquet, held at the Shamokin Area High School Cafeteria Commons.

You say you haven't been there for quite a few years, or maybe never been there. This is what we have to offer. We begin with a non-alcoholic punch gathering. Followed by a sit down family style dinner consisting of two meats and all of the trimmings. After dinner we have our annual alumni meeting in the Auditorium lasting no more than 30-40 minutes. There are door prizes to be given away. After the meeting an After-Glow affair with dancing and a buffet style menu. All of this for a cost of \$17.50 per person or \$35 per couple. Two dollars of this cost is used to pay your \$2 annual dues.

Why do we carry this tradition year after year? Here are some facts:

The first annual reunion, attended by 28 members, including the 1884 class was held in D. B. Felix's Ice Cream Parlors, (most of us probably did not know that a place like that existed) on May 7, 1884 following graduation exercises. (Today students don't graduate until June) According to records, a "sumptuous feast" was served and after a rousing business meeting, the evening was devoted to socializing and "cracking jokes" over well laden tables. (Can't we put aside the TV and other outside activities for one night and join fellow graduates of Shamokin Area High School and bring back the idea of socializing with people.)

The By-Laws were presented at a meeting on September 8, 1884 its object "to strengthen the kind feelings and maintain the friendship which bind together the graduates of Shamokin High School and to perpetuate the memory of our Alma Mater". (Wow, can you just imagine people today having these same values.)

The affairs of the association are administered by an Executive Committee composed of officers and two representatives from each class. (It would be nice if these representatives could find time to attend the three meetings and the annual reunion. We really need more participation and especially from the younger graduates.)

Your Officers, Executive Committee, and Class Representatives, and Especially your Banquet Committee would like to extend the same feelings to you this year to attend our Annual Reunion, Saturday, May 23, 1998, at six thirty at the Shamokin Area High School Cafeteria Commons. It is simply wonderful that we can carry on the tradition 87 years later.

At the ninth annual meeting 1892 it was resolved to permit the non-graduate wife or husband of a member to attend the meetings and reunions. (Consider spending a night out with your spouse and sharing old times with former classmates.)

In 1908 (Just think what modern technologies were not invented yet) the alumni reunion was held at the Edgewood Park Theater. The business meeting started at 8:00. A concert by "Our Band" at 9:00. The banquet was scheduled for 10:00 catered by Moore's Cafe. At 11:00 at the Edgewood Pavilion the Grand Cotillion music by the Pavilion Orchestra.

The 27th anniversary June 3rd, 1910 announcement read like this:

MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE that the celebration of the anniversary occasion this year will begin with an elaborate banquet, to be given in the Skating Rink, commencing promptly at nine o'clock. It is believed that this innovation will meet with popular approval. In order that this plan may be carried out successfully the Committee earnestly requests that our members arrange to be on hand promptly at the hour of nine. The banquet will be made the feature of the evening.

ALL EVENTS with the exception of the dance, will take place in the Rink which will be beautifully decorated. Following the banquet, the annual business session will be held. There will also be a short program of entertainment.

THE DANCE will be held on the Pavilion. Good music will be furnished by an orchestra of accomplished musicians.

THE SUBSCRIPTION has been fixed at \$1.00 covering banquet fees and dues. Members not attending the banquet are expected to make payment of the annual dues, 25 cents.

IT IS EARNESTLY HOPED that there may be a showing of loyalty for Alma Mater this year more splendid and glorious than ever; and to this end we would urge our members, one and all, to come and help make memorable the night of June 3rd, 1910.

MAL PAUL, A WRESTLING LEGEND

Mal Paul, who made the name Shamokin High School synonymous with excellence in wrestling across the state, died on February 20, 1998 after a long fight with cancer.

Mal Paul was an outstanding wrestler and football player for the Shamokin greyhounds where he lettered three years in both sports graduating in 1936. He captained both teams his senior year. As a wrestler his senior year he won the first National Prep School Tournament at Lehigh University (pre PIAA) at 165 lbs.

Mal earned a football scholarship to Muhlenberg College (did not have a wrestling program until his senior year). Again he lettered three years in football and captained the Mules his senior year. He won a Middle Atlantic Conference title becoming the Mule's first ever MAC wrestling champion. Again, he was named captain of their first wrestling team.

Mal obtained the rank of captain in the U.S. Army during World War II.

After the war (1946), Mal returned to Shamokin as a social studies teacher, assistant football coach and head wrestling coach. He reinstated the sport of wrestling at Shamokin which had a three year hiatus. Not only did he start up a varsity program, he was one of the very first coaches to start a junior high program at this time. Over the next nineteen years Shamokin excelled in wrestling like no other time in its long history. Mr. Paul's teams compiled a record of 195-35-2 for a winning percentage of 85. His 1957-58 team finished undefeated (15-0) and ten of his other squads finished with just one loss. His teams competed against competitive schools such as Clearfield, Bellefonte, Philipsburg, Lock Haven, Muncy, Easton, Kingston, Forty Fort and Allentown. In nineteen years, his team's won fourteen District Four titles. Mal coached eight individual state champions, eight state runners-up, twenty regional champions and eighty two district champions.

In 1950 Mal started up an elementary wrestling program at Shamokin, one of the earliest in the region if not the state. Also, at this time, he along with his long time assistant, Lyman "Beans" Weaver started a junior high - junior varsity tournament called the Optimist Novice Wrestling Tournament (another first of its kind in the region). During the 1950's Coaches Paul and Weaver would hold wrestling clinics at Shamokin inviting regional non wrestling high schools hoping to encourage or influence them into the sport of wrestling. They also went to neighboring schools such as Ashland (pre North Schuylkill), Selinsgrove and Northumberland (pre Shikellamy) to put on clinics. North Schuylkill and Selinsgrove started within the next year after their visit.

After teaching and coaching for nineteen years, Mal served as high school principal for fourteen years at Shamokin before retiring in 1979. Mr. Paul was one of the earliest inductees (8th overall) into the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

He is also listed as one of the "early promoters of wrestling in the state of Penna." in The History of the PIAA State Wrestling Championships.

Mr. Paul's most gratification is that almost seventy-five percent of his wrestlers went on to college and the successes that his former wrestlers have earned in all walks of life.

Mr. Paul will be inducted posthumously into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame this April 25 at the Genetti Hotel in Williamsport.

Mal is survived by his widow Dorothy (Heebner); two daughters, Mrs. Ned (Karen) Sodrick, Paxinos and Mrs. Mario (Luanne) Cornacchio, Wilkes Barre; one sister, Mae Christ, Shamokin; and four grandchildren.
