### Start preparing! PSSAs and Keystone Exams are almost here!

It's that time of year again! Temperatures are warmer. Birds are singing. Spring sports are underway! And, yeah... it's testing season!

The Pennsylvania System of School Assessment exams for third through eighth grade students will be April 25-27, English Language Arts; May 2-3, math; and May 5-6, science. Keystone Exams for high school students will be May 15-17, algebra; May 18-19, Literature; and May 20, Biology.

PSSAs measure how well students have mastered Pennsylvania Academic Content Standards in the areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science Technology. The testing content is what students should know and be able to do at various grade levels.

Keystone Exams are end-of-course assessments designed to evaluate proficiency in academic content in the areas of Algebra I, Literature, and Biology. Pennsylvania adopted the Pennsylvania Core Standards, standards aligned with expectations for success in college and the workplace. The Keystones are designed to measure these standards. Both tests include multiple choice questions and open-ended or constructed-response questions.

In a letter to parents and guardians in February, PA Secretary of Education Noe Ortega stated, "There have been significant changes to assessment and accountability in Pennsylvania in recent school years. In response to student, parent, and educator feedback, the length of the PSSA was reduced by 20 percent. The testing window was shortened, and the assessment is administered later in the school year to provide more time for teaching and learning."

As for high school students, effective with the graduating class of 2023, Act 158 will provide additional pathways for students to meet statewide graduation requirements. Signed into law by Gov. Tom Wolf in 2018, Act 158 will give students options to demonstrate postsecondary preparedness through pathways that more fully illustrate college, career, and community readiness. Keystone Exams will continue as the statewide assessment Pennsylvania uses to comply with student learning accountability and must be taken whether or not the student passes.




According to the website, *History.com*, in ancient times, people celebrated the Lupercalia in mid-February. This feast was dedicated to the Roman god Faunus, the god of agriculture and fertility. The celebration was quite different from the modern holiday; it involved animal sacrifices and superstitions. If you paid attention in English 10 class during The Tragedy of Julius Caesar, there is a mention of the Lupercal when Antony had to run a race, which was believed to help infertile women have children.

Other mythological characters that influenced Valentine's Day are the Greek god, Eros, the god of love; and his Roman counterpart, Cupid.

Later, the Catholic church recognized at least three different saints who were martyred,

which means being tortured and put to death for one's religion or beliefs. One was a third century Roman priest who opposed the emperor's decree that all soldiers should be single, not married, men. The priest secretly conducted marriage ceremonies between the soldiers and their lady loves. When the emperor found out, he immediately put the priest to death. Another saint, St. Valentine of Terni, was the person for whom the holiday is named after. When he helped Christians escape Roman prisons, Bishop Valentine was jailed and then beheaded. During his imprisonment, Bishop Valentine became friends with the jailor's daughter. To show his love for her, he sent her a note that he signed "Your Valentine." That loving gesture later inspired the modern-day Valentine's holiday.

## Berry reigns as "The King of Rock and Roll"

To some he was "The Father of Rock and Roll." To others he was "The King of Rock and Roll." And finally, in formal circles, he was "The Prime Minister of Rock and Roll." Whatever his title, the legendary Chuck Berry and his music inspired people to sing and dance as well as influenced singers and songwriters through decades.

Born October 18, 1926 in St. Louis, MO, Berry's interest in music started at an early age. Sadly, when Berry was in high school, he was convicted of armed robbery and sent to a reformatory from 1944-1947. When he was released he married Themetta "Toddy" Suggs and focused on automobiles. He and his wife had four children: Ingrid, Charles Jr., Melody, and Aloha Berry.

Berry performed with many bands and credits his friend Ira Harris for showing him techniques for playing the guitar. In 1955 he signed his first label to "Chess Label." His voice is one of a kind and his songs introduced the world to rock and roll. Berry also was known for his energetic performance style as he would strut low while playing his guitar. He is known for many hits, including "Maybellene," "Johnny B. Goode," "No Particular Place to Go," "My Ding-A-Ling" and "Nadine." Many people may not know that he sang "Run Rudolph Run," too.



Berry's life was filled with family and music but he also had additional run-ins with the law. He was convicted "Under the Mann Act" for illegally transporting women across state lines. With everything that happened he still managed to make people happy with his music. He was married nearly 70 years and was 90 when he died on March 18, 2017. Berry, a talented rock and roll pioneer, impacted many people's lives.



#### Queen of Soul deserves R-E-S-P-E-C-T

Queen of Soul Aretha Franklin started off as a child prodigy in Memphis, Tennessee, and quickly skyrocketed to fame as an inspirational singer, musician, and Civil Rights activist.

Aretha, who was born in 1942, experienced many difficulties throughout her life. When her parents' marriage fell apart, her mother left with her brother. Aretha, who was six years old at the time, continued living with her sisters and her father, who was a very prominent preacher. Aretha began singing in her father's church and wowed the congregation with her amazing voice. While her mother visited the family frequently, she sadly passed away when Aretha was only 10 years old. By the time Aretha was 12, she gave birth to her first son, Clarence Franklin, who was named after her father. Through a series of relationships in her adult years, she had three more sons. Other hardships that Aretha dealt with included failed marriages, career troubles, and health issues.

Despite these challenges, Aretha continued to hone her singing talents and taught herself to play the piano. Because of encouragement from her father and his friends, many of whom were famous musicians, Aretha continued to flourish as a talented Gospel, Blues, and Jazz singer. At 18 years old, Aretha moved to New York City and began her professional singing career. Among her hits were "I Never Loved a Man (The Way I Loved You)," "Respect," "Chain of

Fools," and "(You Make Me Feel Like) A Natural Woman."

Aretha earned many honors, including being named the first female inductee into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. *Rolling Stone* magazine chose her as its "#1 Greatest Singer of the Rock Era." Aretha also was a Civil Rights activist; at 16 years old she went on tour with Martin Luther King Jr. In addition to her support of Civil Rights, Aretha also endorsed the Black Power movement and was a staunch feminist and anti-war activist. Aretha died Aug. 16, 2018.



**Just Friends**: High school student Chris Brander (Ryan Reynolds) loves his best friend, Jamie Palamino (Amy Smart). He finally confesses his feelings, but she tells him that she just wants to be friends, and he leaves town in shame. Ten years later, Chris is a successful record executive and involved with self-absorbed pop star Samantha James (Anna Faris). He still pines for Jamie, though, and when his plans to go to Paris for the holidays fall through, he returns to his hometown to try and win her heart.

My Bloody Valentine(2009): Ten years ago, an inexperienced coal miner named Tom Hanniger (Jensen Ackles) caused an accident that killed five men and put a sixth, Harry Warden, into a coma. A year

Also living there is Lady Lucille, Thomas' alluring sister and protector of her family's dark secrets.
